Welcome to the 2026 EUSAAP Conference, organised by the European Union Association Asia Pacific (EUSAAP), and co-organised by the European Union Studies Association Japan and Hitotsubashi University!

The EU is currently facing unprecedented crises, such as the war in Ukraine and the uncertainties brought about by the second Trump administration. The current turbulent environment is transforming European society. The conference will provide participants with a deeper understanding of the complexities of the EU's current situation and its relationships with the wider world, particularly in the Asia-Pacific region.

This year's conference will open with a public panel discussion on the first day, featuring H.M. Ambassador Jean-Eric Paquet as the keynote speaker alongside other panellists. This public panel discussion will be followed by panel sessions covering key issues ranging from the EU's strategic autonomy and immigration to technology and AI. There will also be many sessions relating to the EU's role in the Indo-Pacific region and global environmental issues.

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine and U.S. attacks on Iran, the multilateralism and the rule of law that the EU has upheld are under threat. Transatlantic relations are in a crisis unlike anything we have seen since the end of the Second World War. Conversely, we are seeing much closer ties between the EU and the Asia-Pacific region today. This creates larger opportunities for Asia-Pacific partners to collaborate with the EU. With a larger presence across the globe, the EU's role is now being examined from various perspectives.

At this pivotal moment in world history, the EUSAAP Conference 2026 in Tokyo warmly invites all participants eager to deepen their understanding of the EU's evolving role in an era of turbulence.

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General Information about Transportation, Currency and Safety

For the convenience of conference participants, we provide an overview of transportation options from Tokyo's two main international airports—Haneda Airport and Narita Airport—to central Tokyo.

From Haneda Airport (HND)

Haneda Airport is located relatively close to central Tokyo, and travel typically takes 30–60 minutes depending on the destination.

- [Keikyu Line \(train\)](#): Direct access to central Tokyo. *Approximate fare*: JPY 500–600
- [Tokyo Monorail](#): Connects Haneda Airport to Hamamatsucho Station (JR Yamanote Line). *Approximate fare*: JPY 550
- [Airport Limousine Bus](#): Direct service to Tokyo Station. *Approximate fare*: JPY 1,000–1,500
- **Taxi**: Convenient but more expensive. *Approximate fare*: JPY 7,000–12,000

Note: Some taxis may not accept credit cards. Carrying cash (JPY) is recommended.

From Narita Airport (NRT)

Narita Airport is located farther from central Tokyo, and travel typically takes 60–90 minutes.

- [Keisei Skyliner \(Keisei Line\)](#): Fast service to Nippori station and Keisei Ueno station. *Approximate fare*: JPY 2,500–3,000
- [Narita Express \(JR Line\)](#): Direct service to Tokyo station. *Approximate fare*: JPY 3,000–3,500
- [Airport Bus](#): Direct service to Tokyo Station. *Approximate fare*: JPY 1,500–3,000
- **Taxi**: *Approximate fare*: JPY 30,000–50,000. Not generally recommended due to high cost.

Transportation Passes for Visitors

Several convenient passes are available for international visitors:

- [Japan Rail Pass](#): Unlimited travel on JR lines nationwide for a fixed period.
- **IC Cards ([Suica](#) / [PASMO](#))**: Rechargeable IC cards usable on trains, buses, and at many shops and vending machines. Available at major train stations.
- [Tokyo Subway Ticket \(24/48/72-hour passes\)](#): Unlimited travel on Tokyo Metro and Toei Subway lines.

Taxi and traffic

- **The sign displayed on the windscreen indicates the taxi's status**: red means available, orange means reserved, and green means occupied. Please raise your hand to hail a taxi.
- Like in the UK, people drive on the left in Japan.

Payment Methods

- Currency used in Japan is the Japanese yen (JPY). Credit cards (Visa, Master Card, American Express, etc.) are widely accepted in Tokyo, especially in hotels, restaurants, and major transportation services. However, Japan is still somewhat cash-oriented. While Tokyo is close to being cashless, you may still need cash in smaller shops or when traveling to rural areas.

Access to Cash

- ATMs are widely available at banks, airports, and convenience stores.
- We recommend carrying some Japanese yen in cash during your stay.

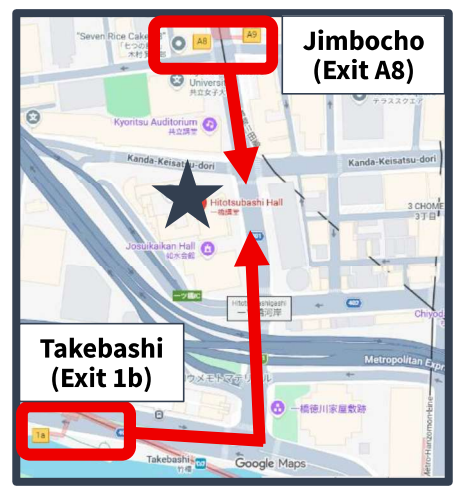
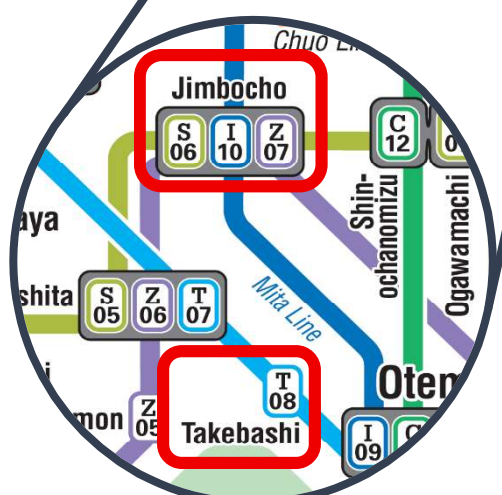
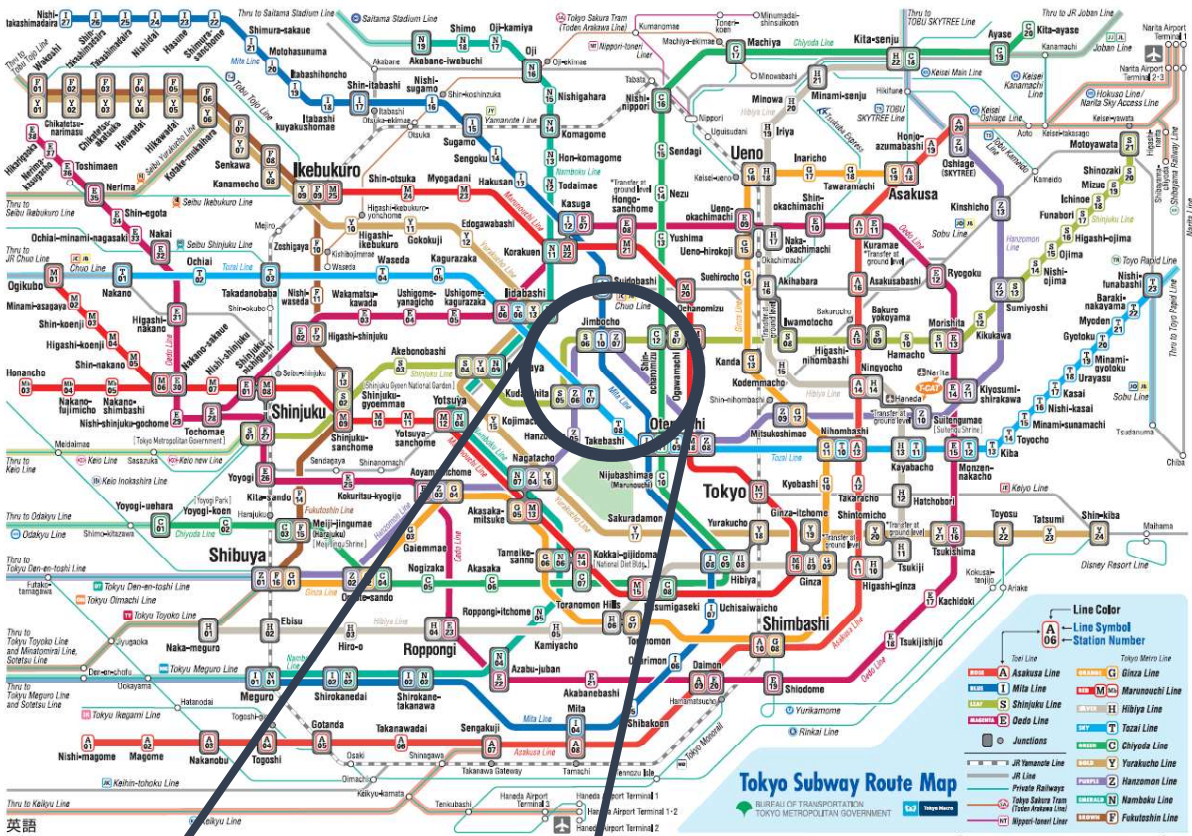
Safety

- **Avoid illegal taxis (“unlicensed taxis”)**: Always use authorized taxi services arranged through official taxi stands, hotels, or reputable ride-hailing apps such as [Go](#) or [S.Ride](#). Ride-sharing services such as Uber are not permitted in Japan in the same way as in some other countries. Unlicensed drivers may overcharge or pose safety risks.
- **Beware of pickpocketing and theft**: Japan is generally safe, but keep your belongings secure at all times, especially in crowded areas such as public transportation, tourist attractions, and event venues.

Local Transport to the Venue

The [Hitotsubashi Hall](#) (2-1-2 Hitotsubashi, Chiyoda-ku, Tokyo 101-8439), which is a part of the building of the Chiyoda Campus of Hitotsubashi University located in Chiyoda ward in Tokyo.

Tokyo's city centre has a very extensive public transportation system. The main options are trains, subways, and buses. Many lines are operated by some companies [Tokyo Metro](#), [Toei Subway](#) and [JR East](#). IC cards such as [Suica](#) or [Pasmo](#) can be used for quick and cashless travel. 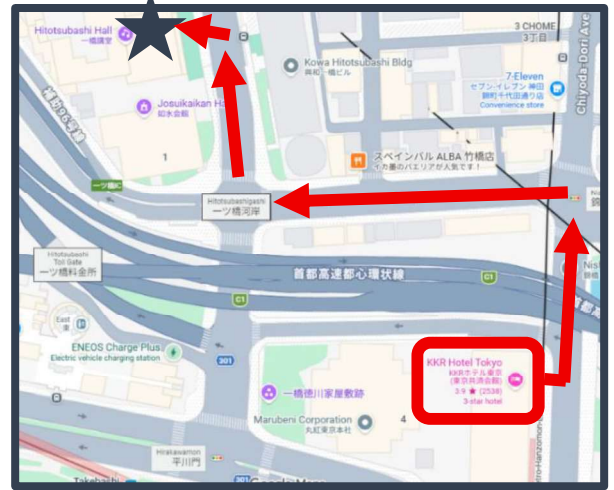
The Hitotsubashi Hall is accessed 3-5minutes

Power Plugs & Wifi

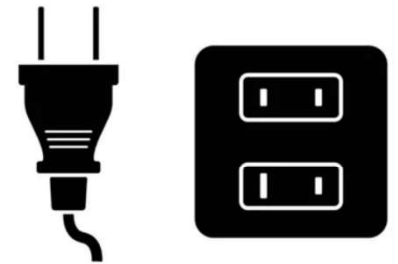
Currency exchange services are available at the airport and some hotels.

Type A Power Socket: Japan uses Type A sockets with two flat parallel pins.

*Adapters for converting other plug types to Type A may be difficult to find in Japan.

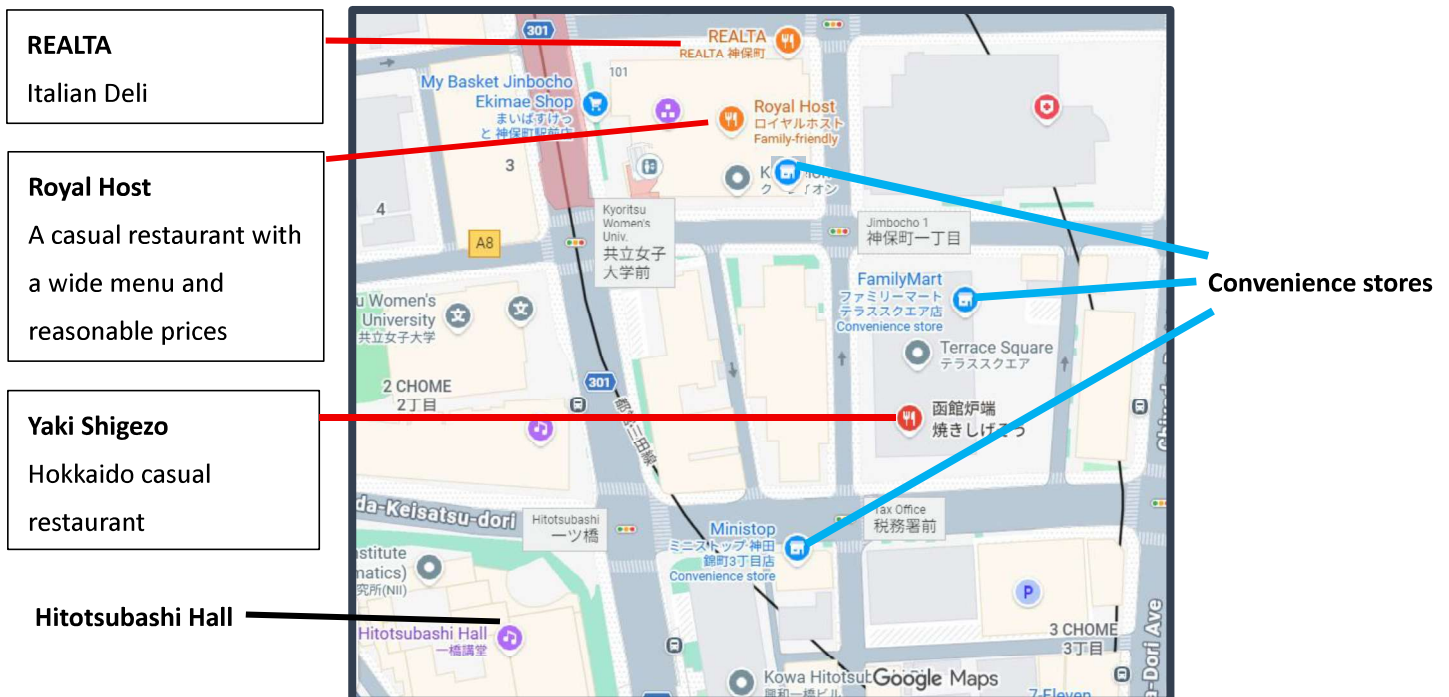
Ensure you prepare your appropriate adapter in their home country.

Voltage: The standard voltage is 100V at 50Hz (in east Japan including Tokyo) or 60Hz (in west Japan).



Free Wi-Fi is available at the Hitotsubashi Hall and the KKR Hotel Tokyo. If your internet connection is not encrypted, there is a risk that your communications may be intercepted by third parties. You may also be unknowingly connected to a fake access point, which could result in the theft of sensitive information such as your ID, password, or credit card details. In particular, public Wi-Fi networks without password protection can pose a higher risk. We recommend purchasing a mobile Wi-Fi device or a SIM card in advance to ensure secure and reliable internet access during your stay.

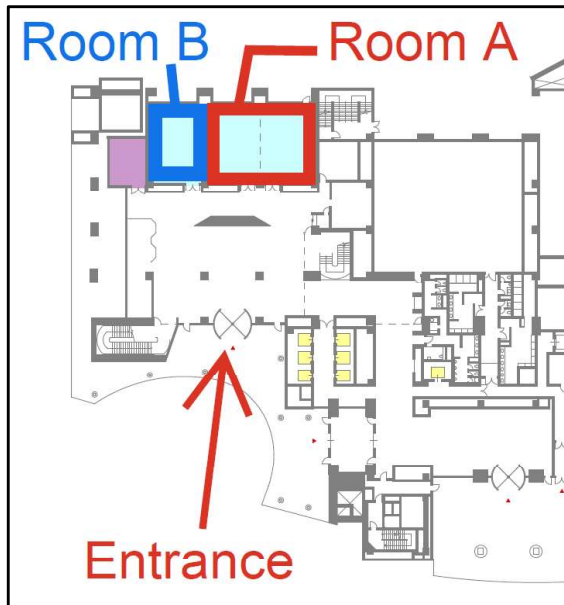

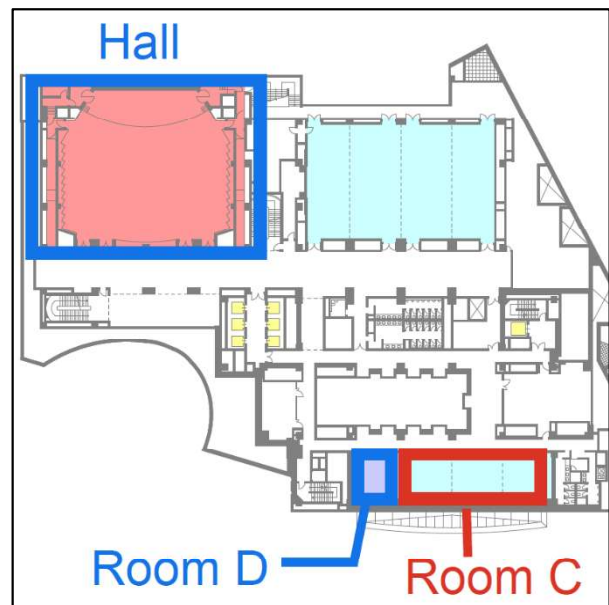

2nd Floor

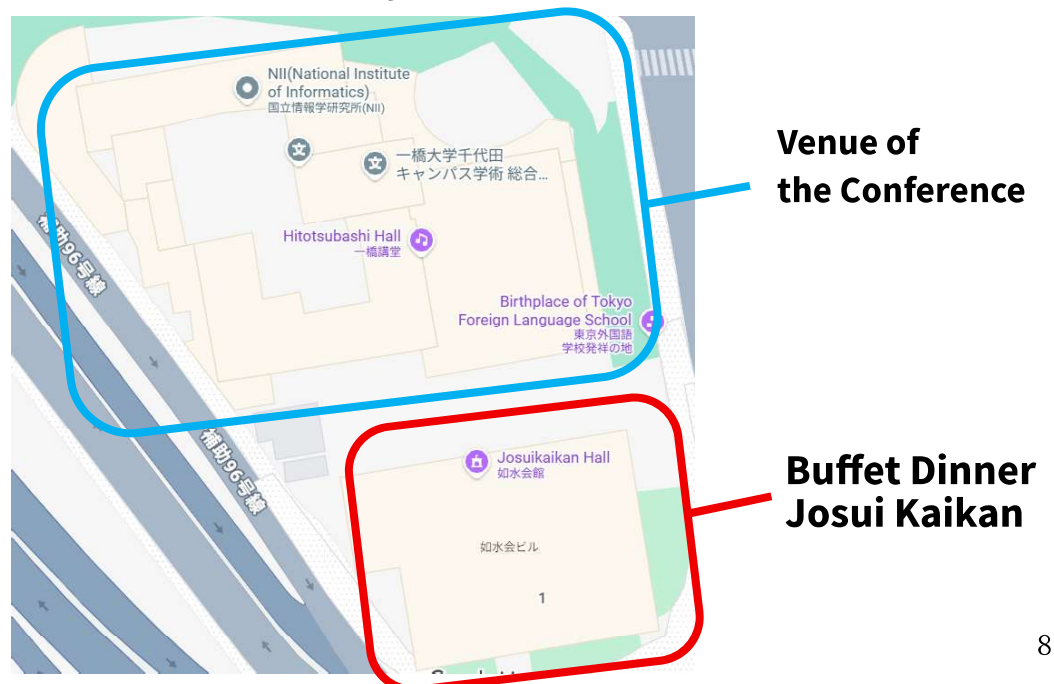
